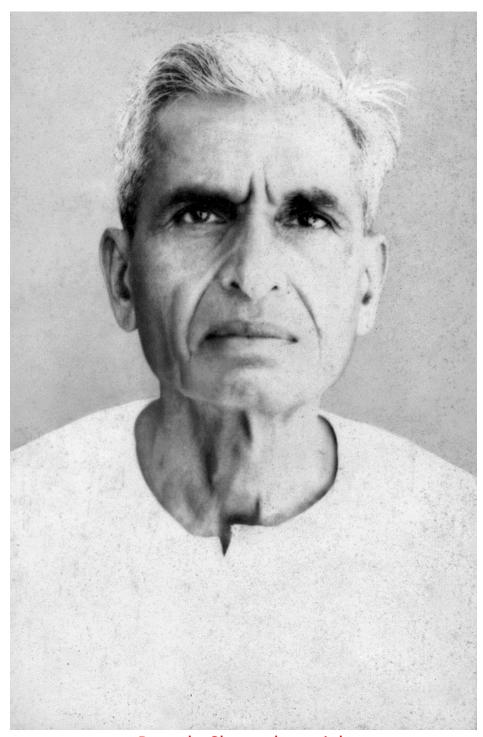

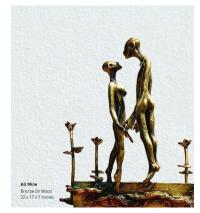

## Painter-Laureate from Bangalore

## The Art of Rumale Chennabasaviah

A Retrospectice exhibition of the artworks of Rumale Chennabasaviah will be conducted at NGMA, Mumbai. The retrospective will feature 80 works and 3 prints of the artist that span 3 major genres: cityscapes (special emphasis on the blossoms of Bangalore), landscapes, and spirituality. The exhibition is co-curated by Mr. KS Srinivasa Murthy from Rumale Art House, Bengaluru and Ms. Shruti Das, Deputy Curator of NGMA Mumbai. Ms. Nazneen Banu, the former director of NGMA initiated Bangalore, who Mumbai and retrospective, is delighted that it has finally come to Mumbai.

'Painter-Laureate of Bangalore' was the name conferred upon Rumale Chennabasaviah by renowned litterateur Professor V. K. Gokak. He was also referred to as 'The Artist Mentor' by renowned artist and teacher Nadoja R.M. Hadapad.

Godfather to him. Sanjay is an Engineer and takes care of Rumale Art House.)



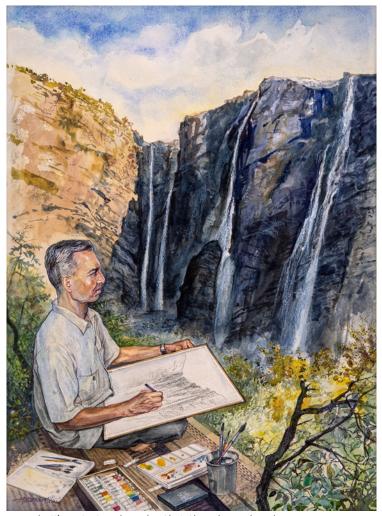
Statue of Shri Rumale Chennabasaviah

The flaming Gulmohars and purple, yellow and pink flowers that adorn the skyline of Bangalore have been immortalised by Rumale Chennabasaviah. The red gulmohar flowers etched on canvas seem to be sewn in silk and the shadows disclose the story of a city in bloom. The golden yellow showers of the Indian Laburnum, the rich orange of the Flame of the Forest, the pink Cassia Javanica, Jacaranda's, Gulmohur and the Frangipani flowers lining Bengaluru's streets were captured by him on paper and canvas.

He was inspired by nature and as a true impressionistic artist, sat at the venue and painted in 'plein-air'. He was seen painting at various venues in Bengaluru. He often trekked several kilometres with his art materials to the locales that suited him and waited for the perfect light and painted.

He worked in both watercolours and oil paints and mastered the British watercolour technique and

painted landscapes in large dimensions from nature – an achievement that set him apart in the pantheon of artistic greatness.

Born on September 10, 1910, in Doddaballapura, Bengaluru, Rumale Chennabasaviah was a multifaceted personality. A disciplinarian to the core, he imbibed qualities like righteousness and the practice of meditation from a very young age. He was spiritual and believed he was guided by a destiny to serve his country. Rumale studied art in 1929 at Kalamandira School of Arts, Bengaluru and at Chamarajendra Technical Institute, Mysore in 1931. In his early years, he remained an artist until he turned to the freedom movement. He was so committed to serving the country, that he gave up painting and dedicated himself to social reforms and nation-building.

He is one of the founding fathers of Karnataka Chitra Kala Parishath and helped in setting up M S Ramaiah Educational Institutions, a prestigious college in India. When he was MLC, he fought for NIMHANS to remain in Bengaluru and not to be shifted to Ranchi. He went on to become a Member of the Legislative Council of the State of Mysore for two terms between 1952 and 1960. He was the Organising Secretary of Bharata Seva Dala, Mysore State, from 1950-55 and was also the editor of the noted Kannada daily "Thayinadu" from 1956-60. He was instrumental in setting up various educational Institutions in Bangalore.



During his terms as MLC, his vision of the city saw a marked change and he realised the conscious effort of Krumbiegel and other botanists to create a series of floral zones. Rumale's association with Stetaslov Roerich was also a significant milestone that set the backdrop of a rich artistic heritage of the city.





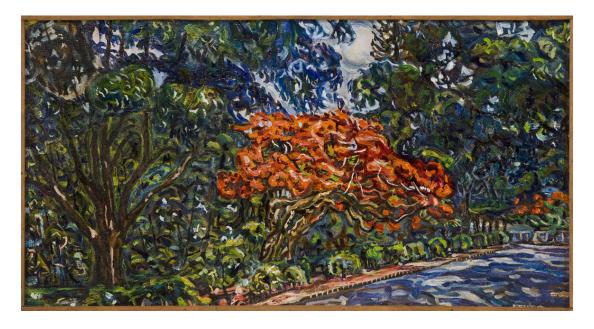
In 1962, at the age of 52, he left his political and social life and turned towards art and spirituality. He painted a few portraits including rare portraits of his gurujis —

Shriman Tapaswiji Maharaj and Sri Sri Sri Shivabalayogi Maharaj in the State of Sahaja Samadhi.

He set up Rumale Art House, Bengaluru's first private art gallery, in 1973 to display his works. Rumale received several awards, including the Dasara, Karnataka Lalit Kala Academy, All India Fine Arts and Crafts Society, and Karnataka State Rajyotsava awards.



Rumale was posthumously bestowed the status of the Distinguished Citizen of Bangalore in the year 1988 after he passed away in Bengaluru in February 1988, succumbing to injuries sustained in a road accident. His life is a testament to a life lived well and on his terms. His devotion to work and the cognizance and value of time and resources is an inspiration for generations.



# Creating a Beautiful World in Black and White Vikram Valsala

An artist derives the meaning of life through careful observation and perception and creates a world of subjective disposition.

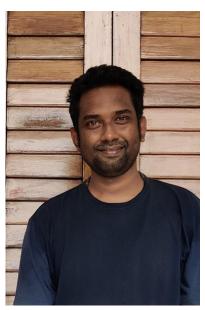
Vikram Valsala is an artist from Kerala and a promising star in the art world. His works in charcoal are myriad lines and shades that shimmer through the white canvas or paper. The obscure lines and shades merge and his drawings explain the unpredictability of the physical universe in a semi-abstract tone.

The concept is given various dimensions, and the medium allows viewers to use their imagination to connect with the space in ways that suit their ideas.

Vikram Valsala

Vikram found his truest expression through the medium of charcoal. With this humble medium, he captures the essence of emotion, the depth of human experience, in a symphony of shades and shadows. His charcoal sketches are more than mere drawings; they are windows into the soul, mirrors reflecting the complexity and nuance of the human spirit. Sculpture was his chosen field for a Master's degree from the University of Hyderabad. A one-year study program in sculpture at Ecol De Beaux Art France broadened his perspective of art. Vikram is inspired by El Greco and his paintings have had a great impact on him. "The use of brushstrokes to express oneself is an intriguing aspect of El Greco's paintings. A painting titled 'View of Toledo' by El Greco is a prime example of this." says Vikram.





A keen observer, Vikram is aware of the history and diversity of India. He believes that within India, religious ideologies have impacted the landscapes and this can be seen throughout the country. "The majority of my inspirations come from my travels and I have noticed the transitioning and merging of cultures across India," he says. Vikram observed the marquee of absolute disregard for nature and the blatant advancement in construction at every place. Modern cities have been carved from landscapes that were the essence of nature and this is solely due to humans' covetousness to acquire material gains. Vikram includes these structures in his art too.



Iron is Vikram's chosen medium of sculpture. He also uses ornamented cast iron to create traditional art forms and also subjects related to different relegions.

He has had various group exhibitions. Some are as follows. 'An Old man asked where is the Centre of the Earth and the Kid Replied' Group show at Durbar Hall Art Gallery Kerala and Biophilia at Kozhikode, Kerala are some of his recent group shows. His earlier group show was at Srishti Art Gallery Hyderabad, Chitrasala Art Gallery, Thrissur, Gallery Veda, Chennai and Alliance Francais de Trivandrum. He participated in a recent art exhibition titled, 'Possible Lands' at Niv Art Centre, New Delhi.



'Something in the dark' was a solo show at Gallery Nany in Kerala. In the year 2012, he participated in a group show titled, Mediated Experience at Ecol De Beaux Art Marseille in France.

He is the recipient of scholarships from the French Embassy and Kerala Lalith Kala Akademi. He has also attended various art camps that have added to his artistic skills and facilitated in enhancement of his dexterity.

# The Sky, The Sea, The City Gallery Sumukha, Bangalore

'The Sky the Sea the City' an art exhibition of works by Surekha Sharada, Pushpamala N and Ayisha Abraham, at Gallery Sumukha takes visitors on a journey to the past. It's a nostalgic reaffirmation of a past that dominates our psyche by being present in our existence. It was a unique experiment by Ms. Premilla Baid to bring together three artists who work on similar mediums and belong to the city of Bangalore.





Surekha's works showcase "Sea watchers" of the day by the sea. People sit on chairs, their feet in water and they gaze at the horizon. They sit there in the hope of being able to reach out to a faraway land called home. They remain calm as the waves splash around them. The photographs are a documentation of the reflective paradigm and transport the onlooker into a world of lingering views. The narrative of migration, diaspora and oceanic life offer a stage that sets the story of the sea that engulfs innumerable emotions.



Surekha showcased 4 short videos titled Sea watchers: people sitting on chairs. Fleeting moments: seagulls and waves. River tales: boats with people and birds

River tales: shows birds flying around a boat full of people. The birds fly down for fish disturbed by the speeding boat but the visuals appear otherwise. The birds seem to tug the boat ahead.



In a video documentary titled Indian Arrival Day, (23 mins). The video explores the complex historic relation between Indians' migration to the Caribbean Islands. This video was captured during her art residency in Trinidad. Every year, the first of May is marked as "Indian Arrival Day" in Trinidad, to commemorate the arrival of Indians to the Caribbean islands.



Pushpamala N has never shied from experimenting with tales that lay bare and within everyone's sight, yet the common man fails to decipher them. In the Return of the Phantom Lady (Sinful City), the Phantom Lady rescues an orphaned schoolgirl and exposes the land mafia in a photo-romance set in cinematic locales in the city of Bombay/Mumbai. The locations of Dharavi, Gorai and other regions that maintain the underbelly of the city were a perfect backdrop for the unravelling of the saga and a suitable site for the adventures.

Paris Autumn, a film constructed of still images, showed the artist as a flaneur, investigating the violent history of the city known as the centre of civilization and culture. The stories of Henry IV in the 16th century unearth links that lead to the Louvre in Paris.



Ayisha Abraham is intrigued by the developing infrastructure and pace of development happening all around us. Old houses give way to apartment dwellings and landscapes have transformed into concrete jungles. She observes the life of a solitary aging security guard who seems muted by his helplessness and a job to feed his family. She is fascinated by the emergence of underground spaces in the city and the human existence that thrives in these hidden places. She documented the meagre means of existence of the security guard and the significant things his day is made of. The irony of his life is dominated by the insufficient amount he earns for his livelihood. Ayisha discovered that the security guards were farmers, gardeners, potters etc. in their hometowns, with unique experiences and memories spanning the past and present.

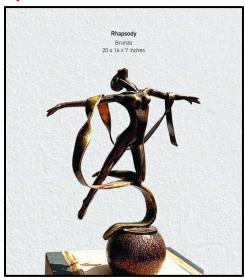


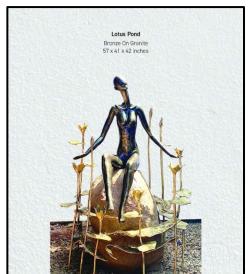

## 'Song of Life', Solo Show by Dimpy Menon Gallery Art Positive, New Delhi







The art exhibition titled 'Song of Life' was a celebration of a lifetime spent conceptualising and creating art in bronze. Dimpy Menon excels in sculpting bronze into playful yet dynamic figures in bronze. Her perspective of life comes alive when you see figures leaping in the air or swirling in a bid to dance to the tunes of songs life offers.

While some figures spring like gymnasts reaching for the sky, others stay grounded to the land with nature surrounding them. Whether it's a dancer caught midtwirl, a sprinter suspended in the rush of movement, or lovers locked in a tender embrace, each creation pulsates with an almost palpable vitality. The medley of a perfect body and mind emotes a response of joyousness and ecstasy. Her vivid imagination finds solace in the fine understanding of the human psyche and the fluidity of the figurines adds a musical element to the metallic wonders.

The figures are almost meditative and the delicate silence that ensues from the sense of motion is a spectacle rarely seen.

Dimpy created the sculptures for her show within six months but she has been working for the last four decades and the experiences and memories of life have enriched her work. The human figures are anatomically accurate and the muscular yet lean humans rouse a sense of inquisitiveness.

The nude statues do not disturb the viewers but leave them stupefied at the elegance of the lean bodies.

Dimpy Menon won the Lorenzo il Magnifico Bronze award at the Florence Biennale in October 2015. Her sculptures are installed at The Trident; Mumbai, The Oberoi Hotel, Alila, Anna Salai; Chennai and various other places across the globe. Dimpy graduated from College of Art, Chennai in 1986 with flying colours and has been working ever since.

## 'Gaze of Silence', Solo show by Vivek Mathew Reves Gallery Bangalore

"Nothing is ever the same. Once a moment has passed by, it's just a memory," says Vivek Mathew at his eighth solo photography exhibition held at Reves Art Gallery in Bangalore.

Titled 'Gaze of Silence', the exhibition is an exploration of a city warped in subdued and poignant moments. He has seen the old-school Bengaluru establishment remain a totem pole for what-was when the what-is and what-will-be grow around and beyond it.



The prosaic profoundness of our surroundings peep through the canvases in a relentless attempt to convey stories - stories of an old bicycle nestled by the window, a man at the coffee shop, a man at the traffic point and a man standing telling tales of a silent moment tucked in memory. The rains added the atmospheric element and dimmed the light to gain a subtle feel to the photographs.

The silhouetted images, raindrops and blurred images seem reflective and add a dreamy connotation to the real world. Vivek doesn't edit his photographs and Is of the view that editing a picture distorts the essence of the art form. The photographs were not clicked with any theme in mind but the subconscious mind was at play and resulted in a milieu of artworks that revolved around a theme. The series is inspired by a legendary photographer, Saul Leiter from New York.

The other photographs of nature were equally vocal in their spirit. Some of them were images of light passing through the leaves. The softness of the light enhanced the image of leaves, creating a surreal experience and the foliage seemed like an extension of the walls. Many of the photographs looked like paintings and were truly inspirational to all visitors. Ever ready to click a photograph, Vivek has grazed through topics from art, architecture, nature, humans, interiors and industrial photographs too.



Vivek has received accolades from art enthusiasts across all genres and was also declared the "Young and Unusual" photographer of today by India Today Magazine. 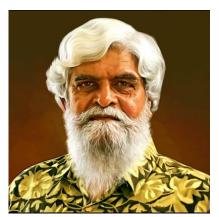

## Curation: The essence of an Art Exhibition

### 'A Visual Vocabulary', Solo show by Satyabrata Das MKF Museum of Art, Bangalore

Satyabrata Das's paintings are reminiscent of and are inspired by the play of colours like the confident strokes of the iconic post-impressionist artist, Vincent Van Gogh. The roll and play of clouds above the sweeping landscapes are a visual narrative of the places the artist has visited and has soaked in. Many are lasting memories of places the artist has visited and attempted to re-create with photo-references of inspiring landscapes of paintings that are pulsating and evocative.



Man's insignificance is apparent against the backdrop of rolling hills and cascading waterfalls in appreciation of Nature, to invite the viewer, to experience the magnitude of what the earth in all her grandeur has to offer mankind.

Spontaneous brush strokes using pigments in a dense and opaque manner, depict the imagery of the force of cascading waterfalls, the scale of Nature while minimizing human figures that facilitates interpretations for the viewer. Relying on Acrylic and Oil mediums on canvas, the artist creates a pictorial vocabulary.

A lyrical rendition lies within a warm palette of colours with the use of black pigment to highlight and create depth to the compositions.

Satyabrata Das is a seasoned artist who plays with the dark and light totality of each composition, to create an impact.



Satyabrata Das, an accomplished artist, was born in the culturally rich state of Odisha. His artistic journey began at the Santiniketan Visva Bharati University, where he studied Fine Arts & Craft, and honed his skills and nurtured his creative spirit. Seeking a broader perspective, Satyabrata pursued an MBA from Pacific States University in Los Angeles. Throughout his educational journey, Satyabrata earned recognition for his artistic prowess, receiving the prestigious Odisha State Gold Medal for his outstanding performance in a spot painting competition. Under the tutelage of eminent artists such as Prof. KG Subramaniam, Prof.

Somnath Hore, and Prof. Ajit Chakraborthy, Satyabrata developed a profound understanding of various artistic forms and techniques. In his early student days at Santiniketan, Satyabrata Das had the privilege of being mentored by the eminent artist and sculptor Sri Ram Kinkar Beij. This mentorship played a pivotal role in shaping his artistic vision and instilling in him the importance of creativity the world and passion in of art. Satyabrata Das lives and works in Bhubaneswar, Odisha.

The show delicately layered the memories of lockdown, isolation, and fragile existence that transpired during the time. Her surreal artwork brought the four phases of experiences, bright, earthy, blues and muted memories.



Chithkala has wonderfully brought the bright side showcasing the beauty in isolation, life in loneliness and her conversation and companionship through acrylic on canvas.



She has painted the joy of solitude that made her embrace the beauty of nature. Her painting of an unwavering buffalo enjoying the waves of Goa Beach at its peace speaks mounts. The view of the sea of trees through the window of the confined room faded her grief of isolation to the delight of being in nature's wonder. She has captured the small joys of life with furry paws Munna and Simba.

The earthy-coloured paintings narrate her calm and composed moments with her grandmother and her home 'My Bougainvillea'. The long gaze of her

grandmother and the hand-stitched Barbie clothes adorned on her walls will engulf one with their family moments.



It is nostalgic and exhibits the experience of warmth. Her grounded life was disturbed as Chitkala's dad had to be hospitalised. The blues and greens on canvas tell the silent tales after she drove her sick dad to the hospital in her confidante Nano car. The canvas with wavering ECG, beeps of machines distracting the silence, Dad's passcode and that last bye brings tears to the edge of my eyes.

The last phase, muted with shades of white paints the sense of loss. The portrait of her dad as a tribute, the brother during the ritual, and the rainbow cake depicts the perfect farewell yet the memory that remains forever. The last painting 'Here Comes the Sun' with varied tones of colour journals the shades lived by Chithkala during the pandemic. 'Dear Pandemic' is a bouquet of Bitter-sweet tales

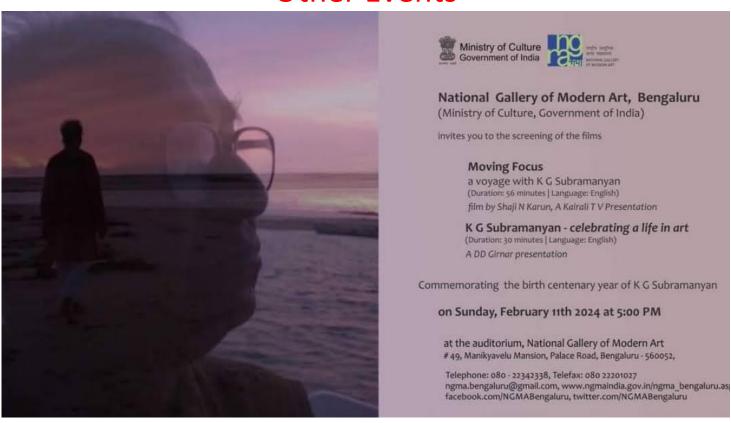
Dwija Art Gallery

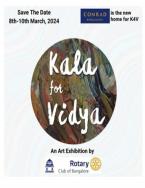

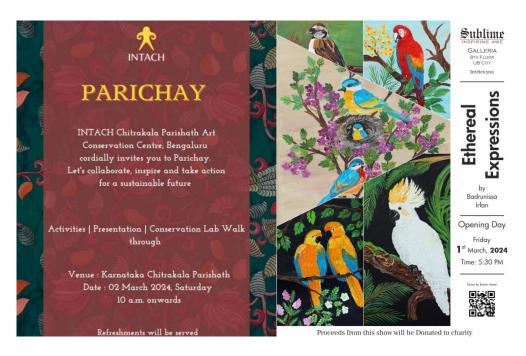
